It was ordered by James Pocock & Samuell Adams, Baylieves & the others of the burgeisses with a generall consent that Jedeon Kingeswell shall repayre and make up his gate & hedge against the highe way in the towne within six days next, upon payne of ------3s. 4d.

That the Widow Aires make her hedge yonn about her garden belonging to her house where she dwelleth within six days next, upon payne of 3s. 4d.

and that whosoever doth not close his or her garden hedges & fences against the streete and round about shall every one loose for every such default not amended within six dayes next after the date should paye for every offence ------3s. 4d.
