THE dumping of thousands of tons of soil and rubble on an ecologically sensitive site at Brading was wrong and must stop.

The IW Council has received expert legal advice saying four years of depositing waste material at Brading Golf Course was unauthorised, could have been prevented and

must cease.

Planners, who consistently said nothing could be done about the situation, have been told by the planning barrister they employed they were wrong in allowing the dumping

Mayor of Brading Marianne Sullivan said: "I am absolutely furious. It is a catalogue of mistake upon mistake upon mistake, each making the situation worse.

"I just can't see the developer doing what the council wants. The best thing that could happen is that the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds could take it over."

IW councillors are now set to take enforcement action against the

They will stop short of revoking planning permission, a move which could cost council taxpayers up to £6 million in compensation.

Instead Tuesday's meeting of the

IW Council's development control committee is being recommended to visit the eyesore site before taking action against the developer who less than 18 months ago gave a renewed assurance that the site would become a golf course.

IW Golf Developments was the latest company to take over the marshland and charge construction companies, including those carrying out the massive Seaclean Wight sewage scheme, to deposit waste

It was not possible this week to contact the company.

The new IW Council stance was

Council planners' frustration at lack of progress with the developer n agreeing a drainage scheme for the course, led to them seeking top legal advice

They received the bombshell news from counsel that the original planning permission which allowed completion five years ago of an 18-hole course should not have allowed the later building up of the site to be car-

ried out to prevent flooding.
Planning team leader Glen
Hepburn said: "With hindsight the complicated nature of this develop-ment could have been tackled by taking counsel's opinion much earlier but the spirit of the habitat regulations was to resolve the matter with the developer which we have attempted to do.

Councillors are recommended to insist the developer grade the deposited material and ensure there are gentle soil-covered slopes to existing watercourses which lead to marshland protected by European environmental designations and in turn to the RSPB's nature reserve.

Flood study set to cost £600,000

£600,000 in a study of the effects flooding of Brading Marshes

Government grants are being sought for the study, which will determine whether sea defences should be strengthened to fight global warming, whether wildlife would benefit from the sea being allowed to floodin or whether there is a compromise solu-

It comes three years after the RSPB spent £500,000 buying 422 acres of Brading Marshes, currently protected by St Helens Duver defences and Embankment Road and several years after the area was designated to be subject only to managed retreat status in a coastal management strategy.

If allowed to happen, that would mean the sea gradually taking over and would eventually lead to a return of the area to how it was before ancient defences were constructed to protect the area and making Bembridge the island it once was.

The Environment Agency and the IW Council aim to work together to mastermind the study and hope to get it approved in a matter of weeks.

News of the study was given to a meeting of the watchdog IW Area Environment Group on Monday, which asked to be kept fully informed and part of a wide consulta-

When managed retreat was first put forward it led to outcry from residents, who would lose their homes and Bembridge Harbour businesses.

"But there may come a point when we return to Isle de Bembridge and some residents will probably be quite pleased about

Environment Agency strategic planning engineer Tony Burch said global warming not only increased flood risk from the sea but from the East Yar river.

Currently, in some tidal and weather conditions, there was only 30 minutes for inland water to drain into the sea. Climate change would further reduce that period.

He said: "The government is guiding us to work with nature for socio-economic and environmental reasons rather than trying to control it and we want the Island to contribute to developing this strategy for

"Properties in Sandown, Brading, Alverstone and Bembridge are at risk."

Members said preventing the severance of a road link had proved paramount to the Seaview coastal defence scheme and to the new road planned for the Undercliff but Mr Burch said there were ways of preserving Embankment Road by putting it on stilts while still allowing managed retreat to take

"When the project starts we will be setting up a representative group of people from the area," he said.

Salt spices up species' chances

AN ISLAND rescue mission for two species threatened with extinction starts in a few days.

The brackish waters of an isolated pocket of marsh adjoining Bembridge Harbour is home to the Bembridge water beetle and the even rarer starlet sea anemone. The Island is one of only a handful of places where it is found.

Outgoing manager of the 570-acre Brading Marshes RSPB reserve, Les Street, told a neeting of the IW Area Environment Group that a gradual decrease in salinity was putting both species at risk and a contractor was stand ing by to carry out work to ensure more salt water found its way to the lagoons inland of Embankment Road.

The work has been pushed forward by the Environment Agency, the RSPB and English Nature and would restore the lagoons, which are designated as a special area of conservation but have deteriorated in recent years.

The joint project involved restoration of sluices to allow improved control of water flows, supported by water quality monitoring before, during and after the engineering

Mr Street said work to save the species coincided with substantial success of the best working relationship with a farmer he had known of

That had resulted in new grazing regimes that greatly improved habitat for birds, plants

Careful work on the marsh drainage resulted in suitable creche conditions for young redshank, resulting in the marsh's single pair producing young that flew for the first time since the RSPB took over.

He said the first three years' work on the reserve concentrated on habitat improvement but now the emphasis would shift to improving public access.

A planning application would shortly be lodged for Embankment Road car parking and public viewpoints, which would boost the Island's tourist economy.


The plan says: "These combined projects are being implemented with other activities and will create the


largest challenge yet faced by the town council and the community of Brading."

Before Christmas two members from Brading were invited to Appley W.I.'s "Christmas Mayhem" and enjoyed a very lively evening.







"From spring to autumn we have a brilliant display of acers," said Mr Trzebski, whose house dates from 1520 to


He said most of the garden would have been laid out in its present format in the late 1800s with the current design undertaken by his late parents, who are buried in



Tapestry remembers battle of Monte Casino

A VETERAN of one of the Second World War's most ferocious and costly battles has spent two years creating a tapestry to commemorate the

Roy Dennis, 84, of Morton Road, Brading, presented his tapestry of the battle of Monte Casino to Polish veterans at the joint First Army and Polish veterans' dinner at the Broadway Park Hotel, Sandown

Mr Dennis's monumental work commemorates the sacrifices made by the Polish armed forces who lost over 1,000 men during an assault on the German stronghold at Monte Casino monastery.

A veteran of the campaign, Mr Dennis watched as the Polish troops were mown down during an attempt to take the German position.

The handcrafted tapestry has 196 stitches to the square inch. The intricate detail of the work includes the Polish flags and the Union Flag intertwined. The tapestry, which is over 2ft square, also carries the slogan For Freedom, Ours And Yours, the motto of the Polish armed

Mr Dennis said he was at the battle area for nine weeks as a member of the Royal Artillery, which pounded the German positions.

He said: "I was there right from the beginning of the assault. It was a big obstacle as far as we were concerned. The Poles went in and stormed the monastery. They were slaugh-tered. One thousand were killed and many more were wounded. I saw this slaughter. It affected me deeply and I



The only real clue that Jeanie is ill is that she walks slower than most. Jeanie was referred to the hospice in September last year and has been attending the day unit since December and currently comes on Mondays and Fridays as a day patient.

She has had cancer for three years, has had chemotherapy twice and even lost her hair and had to wear a wig, a tall order for someone who remains very fashion con-

Mission to Seafarers


