The boundaries at one time reached as far as the outskirts of Ryde to the North, and to the East the parish of St. Helens. South, the outskirts of Shanklin and West, to Winford, Newchurch & Alverstone.

We have a charter dating from the "Middle Ages" and in those times Brading had a Mayor & Corporation and also returned two members to Parliament. We boast of a "quality" Town council, a Town trust, two churches, four public houses and many other desirable amenities.


